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Section 1 – Senior Manager’s Comments

- **Winter conditions played a big role in same-level falls.** JHSCs and HSRs are in a perfect position to flag recurring problem spots—entrances, ramps, walkways, portable toilets—and make sure there’s a plan (and someone assigned) to keep them clear. Small fixes—like clearing icy patches, tidying walkways, or making sure guardrails are in place—can go a long way in preventing serious injuries. As we gradually leave winter conditions, rain will result in mud and puddles that can hide hazards. Keeping an eye on those is also important.
- **Falls from ladders and roofs are still a concern,** so this is also a good opportunity for committees and reps to spark quick, on-the-spot conversations about ladder condition, setup, and whether a different tool might be the safer choice. These informal check-ins can make a real difference in keeping elevated work safer.
- **Struck-by incidents were also far too common,** and JHSC members and reps can play a big role by watching how materials are stored, moved, and handled. A reminder to keep clear of suspended loads and protect pinch points is often all it takes to prevent a close call from becoming something worse.

Ontario and Canada investing more than \$228 million to protect workers and key industries

The Ontario government is taking further action to protect Ontario workers by expanding training and employment supports for those impacted by tariffs and global trade disruptions. Through a \$228.8 million investment from the Government of Canada over the next three years, Ontario will deliver the Canada-Ontario Workforce Tariff Response, helping up to 27,000 workers across the province retrain, upgrade their skills and stay competitive in key sectors of the economy, including softwood lumber, steel and automotive manufacturing.

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Section 3 – Court Bulletin(s)

NOTE: Although the court bulletin referenced below pertains to the *Employment Standards Act*, it is important to recognize the potential consequences of providing false or misleading information to an MLITSD inspector.

Company Fined \$100,000 After Providing False Records to an Officer

Convicted: ML Staffing Solutions Inc., 158 Hester Street, Hamilton, Ontario, a temporary help agency.

Location of Workplace: 158 Hester Street, Hamilton, Ontario

Description of Offences: ML Staffing Solutions Inc. was fined for providing false records and obstructing an employment standards officer during an inspection. By providing false records, the company contravened sections [131\(1\)](#) and [91\(11\)](#) of the *Employment Standards Act* (ESA), both offences under [section 132](#) of the ESA.

Date of Offences: January 27, 2023 to February 3, 2023

Date of Conviction: February 25, 2026

Penalty Imposed:

- Following a guilty plea in the Ontario Provincial Offences Court in Hamilton, the company was fined \$100,000 by Justice of the Peace Fabiano F. de M. Mendes. The Crown Counsel were Sepideh Kamali and Evan Schiller.
- The court also imposed a 25 per cent victim fine surcharge as required by the *Provincial Offences Act*. The surcharge is credited to a special provincial government fund to assist victims of crime.

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Background:

- On December 28, 2022, an employment standards officer conducting an inspection of ML Staffing Solutions Inc. issued a Demand for Records to the company, to determine their compliance with the ESA.
- In response, the company provided partial records. The officer also obtained records from the company's clients and its bank.
- During a review of the records, the officer found multiple discrepancies. While the client and bank records matched, none of the information contained in the company records was accurate. The company had made and provided false records to the officer. As such, the officer was unable to conduct an inspection to determine the company's compliance with the ESA.
- The company failed, as an employer by:
 - producing false records, contrary to [section 131\(1\)](#) of the ESA, which is an offence contrary to [section 132](#) of the ESA.
 - hindering, obstructing and/or interfering with an employment standards officer conducting an investigation, contrary to [subsection 91\(11\)](#) of the ESA, which is an offence contrary to [section 132](#) of the ESA.

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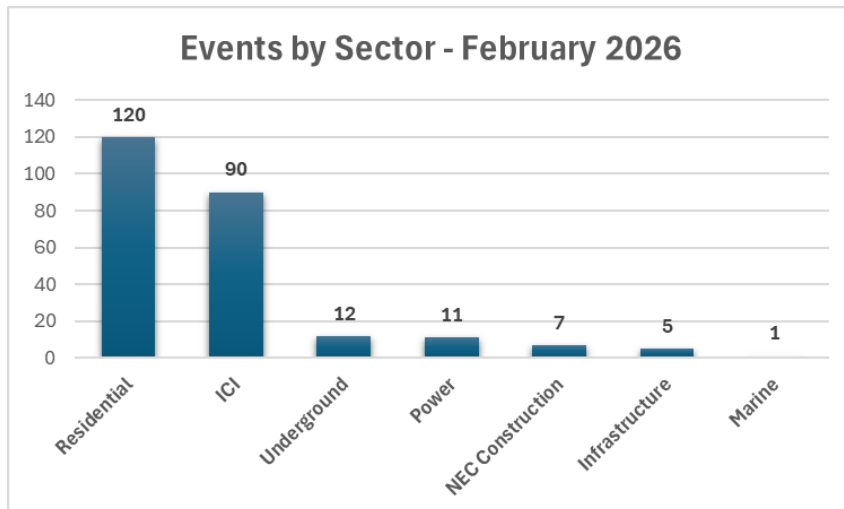
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Section 4 – Enforcement Results and Trends – February 2026

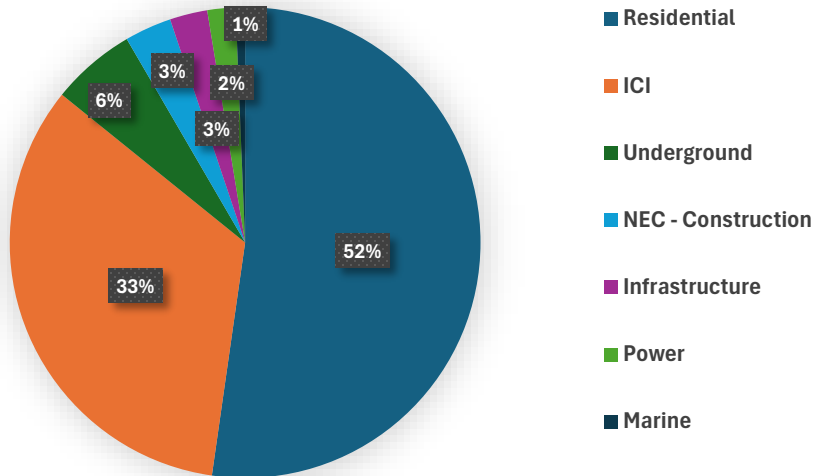

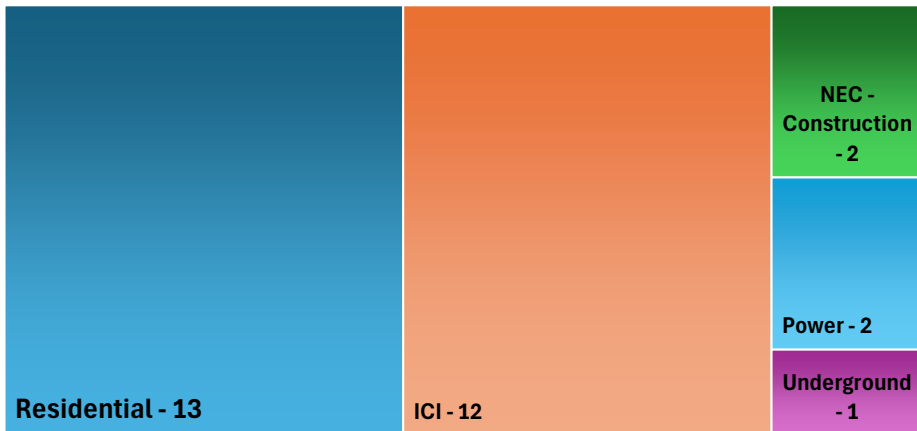
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Complaints by Sector - February 2026
